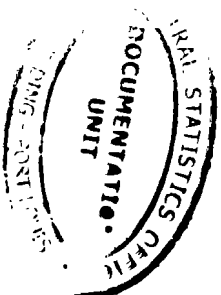

them whether they have sufficient means to purchase the whole crop? They will say, let us purchase all we can at a ruinous price for the producer, and then *miss persons*. Nothing but the immediate establishment of the Government Bank could prevent this state of things, and supply the huge deficiency required to purchase the crop now coming to market. It had been prevented to satisfy the ends of two or three persons in Mauritius and England.

Do we want this immaturity to make matters worse, and prevent us from obtaining a price for our produce according to that in the British market, where prices are certainly low enough? Is it not sufficient that the disease is spreading over the cane fields, that our crop is reduced, and that our taxation remains the same?

Let ten, fifteen or twenty men of intelligence and local experience, real proprietors of the soil, be called together, and then see how they would confirm us in all we advance. They would say—

1. Some system of credit is absolutely necessary, as our produce only comes to market at a certain time of the year, and we are expending and consuming all through the year.

2. The system pursued till now is vicious in principle; experience is there to prove how fatal its consequences may again become to the colony.

3. Another plan is proposed by Government, which is sound and healthy, and we vote for its immediate adoption.

4. Let the chartered company give up a right which is of no use to it, as it prevents the establishment of the government plan.

Is it fair or just that the direction of the finances of a bank should be managed by those who have certain interests to satisfy? And is it not much better that they should be directed by disinterested persons?—That you cannot have in private banks, and we think we may assume it does not exist in the councils of the Commercial Bank.

We see what passes every day where commercial men congregate; we see the price sugar is sold at, and as the funds of buyers decrease (they cannot last for ever), so will prices, from that cause alone, decrease also.

It is therefore clear to us that the decision of the shareholders of the Commercial Bank, on Tuesday last, will tend to aggravate the present difficult and embarrassed position of the colony.

My Lord,  
1. In my despatch, No. 33, of 8th February 1847, I submitted to your Lordship the first Report of the Committee appointed to conduct and complete the census of the colony, under Ordinance No. 4, of 1846. This Report comprised an abstract of the population of each district.

2. I have now the honour to submit the general Report of the Committee, accompanied by a series of tables illustrative of its statements.

3. The Report enters into a detailed account of the mode in which the investigation was pursued; which, I trust, your Lordship will regard as fully entitling it to the confidence claimed for itself on the score of accuracy, and generally inserting your Lordship's commendation for the diligence and method exhibited in its details by the committee.

4. On that part of the subject, second to none in interest, the relative number and conditions of the emancipated population at the present day, the Report, from paragraph 16 to 19 inclusive, amplifies that already submitted; continuing to present more favourable views than those generally entertained heretofore, founded solely upon conjecture, on both these points in paragraph 26 also.

5. I should hope that my giving effect to the proposal of the committee, in the concluding paragraph of their Report, for extending the census to the dependencies of Mauritius, will meet with your Lordship's approval.

MAURITIUS.—CENSUS of 1847.

Port Louis, 1 February 1848.

May it please Your Excellency,  
1. The committee appointed to conduct the census of this colony under the Ordinance No. 4 of 1846, had the honour, on the 15th January 1847, to submit to your Excellency a general abstract of the population of each district, and they are at length enabled to present their general Report, with a series of tables, exhibiting the principal results of the late enumeration.

2. As this is the first occasion on which an attempt has been made to obtain an accurate census of the population of Mauritius, and as a description of the measures taken to ensure accuracy may be useful to satisfy your Excellency, and the Secretary of State as to the credit to be given to the results, the committee would enter into a few brief details upon this point.

3. Hitherto there has never been an actual enumeration of the inhabitants. Up to the period of the emancipation the number of slaves was known, as they were all borne on the registers kept by officers of the government, and up to a comparatively recent period the number of the white and free coloured population was so small, that it could be ascertained with tolerable correctness by the civil commissaries. Until the year 1832, each household, in making a declaration of the property in his possession liable to direct taxation, was required to make a return of his family, and subsequently, from these returns, from the declarations of births and deaths, and of mutations of residence, the civil commissaries prepared annual statements of the population of their respective districts, which were approximate to the truth, in proportion to the industry and conscientiousness with which these officers executed their task. In 1839, after the cessation of the ex-apprenticeship, an attempt was made to effect a correct census, and an ordinance was passed for that purpose; but as it did not provide the civil commissaries with the assistance which was indispensably necessary, the object was not attained.

4. On the present occasion, a committee was appointed to undertake the general management of the census, to ensure uniformity and completeness, and to make an abstract of the results. Upon their suggestion, and with the approbation of your Excellency, the chief commissary of police and the civil commissaries were employed to conduct and superintend the enumeration of their several districts. Each district was divided into a sufficient number of sections, varying according to their size, from three to eight, to enable a distributor of forms to traverse it, and to visit each inhabited house within the period of a few days. The town and district of Port Louis was divided in a similar manner into six sections, to each of which a distributor was assigned.

5. It was intended, at first, to leave a form at each inhabited dwelling-house within the colony before the 1st July; the distributor keeping a register of those delivered, with the name of the occupier, and to require the occupier to fill up the forms with the particulars relating to all persons residing in his house on that day, and to deliver them to the chief commissary of police and the civil commissaries within seven days afterwards. It was found, however, that the distribution in Port Louis could not be completed by the 1st July, and the day was therefore changed by a proclamation of your Excellency to 1st August. The intended plan was carried out with regard to the town of Port Louis, but in the rural districts it was deemed expedient to allow the distributors to make the enumeration and fill up the forms, when convenient, at the time of their visit. The greater part, therefore, of the country returns exhibit the population, not on a fixed day, but on some day, according to the date of the individual returns, between the 15th June and 1st August. All parties, however, were warned that if any change took place before the 1st August, they were to attend at the civil commissaries, and amend their returns accordingly. Consequently, as the mass of the population in the rural districts consists of Indians and their families, working upon annual engagements on the sugar estates, whose returns were made by the proprietors, and as the ex-apprentices are usually very jealous to have all acts of this nature relating to their families carefully registered, there is reason to believe that the returns are free from any material error arising from this cause.

6. As the distributions were to be remunerated according to the number of forms which they delivered in their several sections, it was their interest not to pass over any house; and as they were bound to number, and register in a journal which they carried with them, each form delivered, it could be discovered by a subsequent comparison of the forms delivered with the journals, whether all had been duly returned to the police and civil commissaries.

7. After the delivery of the forms filled up, they were examined, and their correctness ascertained, as far as possible, by the civil commissaries in the country, and by a clerk appointed for the receipt and examinations of the returns in Port Louis, the distributors in both cases giving their assistance.

8. After this verification, they were transmitted to the committee, who then proceeded to the work of abstraction. The distributors appear for the most part to have performed their tasks efficiently, or the principal defects in their returns have been subsequently rectified. The committee, therefore, consider themselves justified in stating that the census has been made as correctly as could be expected, and that its results may be relied upon as being free from all important errors affecting their trustworthiness.

9. In a separate report the committee will point out some improvements in the machinery of enumeration that may be introduced on future occasions, and some difficulties which may

14. The districts, however, stand in a very different order, with regard to the density of the population, which is shown in the following table:—

15. The distribution of the three classes of the population is very different, as will be seen in the annexed table. The town of Port Louis contains one-half of the general population, one-fourth of the ex-apprentices, and one-ninth of the Indians. Of the general population, the three districts of South Pampléonnes, Grand Port and Flacq, contain each about one-tenth; the remaining districts vary from only 22 to 44 per cent.

Of the ex-apprentices, nearly a seventh reside in South Pampléonnes; about a tenth reside in each of the districts of Flacq, Plaines Wilhems and Grand Port; and the other districts vary from 5% to 7%.

Of the Indian population, about one-sixth are employed in each of the districts of Rivière du Rempart and Flacq; one-ninth in North Pampléonnes and Grand Port, one-tenth in South Pampléonnes and Plaines Wilhems, one-twelfth in the Savanne, only 4 per cent. in Black River, and 1 1/2% in Moka.

16. The proportion of the sexes, as exhibited in Appendix No. 1, is, exclusive of the military,—

Of the general population	52 males to 48 females, or 92 females to 100 males.

Average of the 3 classes 66 males to 34 females, or 51 females to 100 males.

It would be superfluous to point out the causes of the excess of males in the two classes of ex-apprentices and Indians. The excess of males among the general population, as compared with Great Britain, where the proportion in 1841 was 49 males to 51 females, may be partly attributed to the peculiar and fleeting character of a colonial population.

17. The statement in Appendix, No. 2, distinguishes, as far as possible, the ex-apprentices surviving at the time of the census, by separating from their families, who were, for the most part, marked in the returns as ex-apprentices, although born after the emancipation, all those who were under 12 years of age, and who consequently were presumed to have been born since February 1835, the date of the emancipation.

may be avoided. They will now proceed to explain the several tables appended to this report, and to notice the most important results of each.

10. In the Ordinance under which the census was executed, no provision was made for ascertaining the number or description of houses existing in the colony; and as the forms to be used were already somewhat complicated, the committee did not consider themselves authorized to require this additional information; and the returns of the servants would not suffice to furnish it, since it is a constant practice for the families of servants and of others to live in the out-houses attached to premises, which cannot be counted as separate dwellings; and no rule was laid down with regard to the enumeration of the inmates of such houses, so that they are sometimes enumerated separately, and sometimes with the family on whose premises they reside.

11. The forms employed were prepared with the view of ascertaining the number and identity of all the Indian immigrant population; but owing to the imperfection of a large portion of the returns in this respect, the attempt was unsuccessful. In future the forms may be much simplified.

12. The first table (Appendix, No. 1) exhibits the population of each district divided into three classes, General Population, Ex-Apprentices and Indians, distinguishing males from females, and separating the military and crews of ships in harbour from the resident population. In this and the following tables, the ex-apprentices are enumerated as such upon their own declaration, and therefore this class may be supposed to comprise only those who belonged to it at the expiration of the apprenticeship in February 1839, omitting those who obtained their freedom between that date and the Act of Emancipation in February 1835. The term "Indian" applies only to those who were declared as immigrant labourers, and their holders or proprietors, did not declare themselves as immigrants, are classed in the general population.

12. The total population of the island, including the shipping, was on 1st August 1840 - 161,080

Exclusive of the shipping - 160,263

Exclusive also of the military - 158,462\*

13. The town of Port Louis contained 45,212 inhabitants, exclusive of the military and crews of shipping, which would raise it to 47,205, equal to 29% of the total population. The other districts stand, with regard to their numerical importance, in the following order:—

\* In Baron Grant's "History of Mauritius," published in 1801, the population of Mauritius in 1779 is stated at 65,000; viz. slaves, 55,000; whites and mulattoes, 10,000. In the Baron d'Unwill's work, published in 1838, the population, in the several years 1817, 1825 and 1839, compiled from official records, is stated as follows:—

The numbers for 1830 are not correctly given, and they do not tally with the detailed statement of the sum of which amounts to 92,544, instead of 96,779. Neither is any explanation given of the large decrease of the population in 1825, which may, however, be in part attributed to the mortality caused by the cholera morbus in 1819.

From this Table it appears,—  
 1. That out of 61,022 slaves, who were enumerated in February 1835, 38,046 declared themselves as ex-apprentices on 1st August 1846. From the former number it may be deduced that those who obtained their freedom before the expiration of the apprenticeship, and to the latter may probably be added a small proportion, who, having advanced in social position, have been reluctant to declare themselves and their families as ex-apprentices. Without making any allowance for these, or other circumstances likely to affect the comparison, the average annual mortality among those who were alive in February 1835 has been 1,097, or 3% per cent. In the class generally, we were alive in February 1835, the decrease has been 11,667, including the children born since February 1835, per cent.  
 2. That the natural proportion of the sexes has been restored among the children born since the emancipation, the proportion of females being even greater than in Great Britain; viz. 47 males to 53 females, or 100 males to 112 females.  
 18. In Appendix No. 3, the limits and population of each division of the town of Port Louis, and of each section in the several rural districts, are indicated, distinguishing the three classes of the inhabitants in the same manner as in the preceding appendices.  
 19. In Appendices Nos. 4 and 5, the ages of each class in the whole island, and in the several districts, are exhibited. The most remarkable results to be derived from the examination of these tables are:—1. The very different proportion of young and old persons in the different classes, arising from the peculiar condition of each; viz.:

2. In the class of ex-apprentices, almost the whole excess of males above females consists of men of 40 years of age and upwards, viz. 61,193 out of 69,180. Of the total male population of this class, those above 40 amount to 43.4 per cent., while in the general population they amount to only 17.8%, and in England and Wales to only 22.8. If, therefore, an apparently excessive mortality should occur within a few years among the old male ex-apprentices, due consideration must be paid to the above circumstances in drawing any inference from the fact.  
 3. The proportion of persons under 20 years of age is much smaller among the ex-apprentices than among the general population; whence it may be inferred that there has been either a deficiency of births, or an excess of mortality, under that age, in the former class; but it is important and gratifying to remark that the difference is very much reduced in the class of children under 5 years of age (especially if, in calculating the difference, allowance be made for the excess of males above females aged 40 and upwards); indicating a diminution of the former unfavourable influences. On comparing the proportion of persons under 20 in the general population with those existing in England and Wales in 1841, there appears a considerable excess in the former. It may, however, happen that in the abstraction of the Returns, a certain portion of the children of ex-apprentices born after the emancipation, may have been classed with the general population, which would explain the differences.

4. With regard to the Indian population, it is in too anomalous a state to offer any subject for remark, except that of the whole population whose ages are stated, nearly 3/4ths or 73% are between the ages of 20 and 40.  
 20. Appendix No. 6 exhibits the counties of birth of the population, from which it appears,—

1. That the inhabitants of European origin constitute little more than 2% of the whole population, and that those of British origin number those of French origin, including those born in Bourbon.  
 2. That of the ex-apprentices, exactly one-fourth are of African origin; there are a few Indians in this class, and the rest are creoles, chiefly of Mauritius.  
 21. In Appendix No. 7, the distribution of the inhabitants of European and American origin is shown. The number of the latter is very insignificant, 61% of the whole number reside in Port Louis. Of the country districts, South Rempdesseuses, Plaines Wilhems, Grand Port and Blacq contain the largest numbers.  
 22. Appendix

22. Appendix No. 8 exhibits the number of Indian immigrant labourers, distinguishing, as far as the Returns will admit, the presidencies from which they came, and whether they arrived in 1834-39, or since the renewal of the immigration in 1843. Unfortunately the Returns were not perfect on this point, many of the planters and others having neglected, or declared themselves unable to furnish all the information required respecting their labourers. Where the Returns were subjected to examination by the Committee, in the work of abstraction, it was too late to take steps to supply the deficiency, and consequently this statement is not complete. Nevertheless it affords this information, that 6,369 Indians of the old immigration were declared, and that if the same proportion existed among those whose time of arrival was not specified, the total number would amount to about 10,300. This was probably the number at the time of the census. In February 1846, the Committee of Immigrant Labour estimated the number at 10,700; from July last up to the present date 9,150 have applied for and obtained tickets, under the Ordinance No. 22 of 1847, from the Protector of Immigrants.  
 23. Appendix No. 9 affords a general view of the occupations of the population of the whole island, and No. 10 furnishes a similar statement for each district. In determining and classifying the occupations the system adopted by the Commissioners of the last census of Great Britain has been followed, excepting that the distinction between persons under and over 20 years of age has not been observed. It was necessary to omit this in consequence of the already increased complication of the return, by distinguishing the ex-apprentices and Indians.  
 24. The following Abstracts exhibit the occupations of the population, and the percentage proportion of each class:

25. Upon these Tables it is only necessary to observe, that under the head "Independent" are included those persons who described themselves as proprietors, without further specification; and that the "Residue of the Population" includes children and all persons following no occupation, or to whom none was assigned.

26. From an examination of this abstract it appears,—  
1. That of the males in each class of the population there were following some occupation, the under-stated proportions, after excluding those classed as "Independent":—

2. That agriculture gives employment to 41.6% of the whole population, and commerce, manufactures and other kinds of labour to 18.5%.

3. That of those engaged in agriculture, 33.6% are employed on sugar estates, the remaining 8% in other branches.

4. That of the ex-apprentices, 21% are engaged in commerce and manufacturing, 17.1% in agriculture; but of these only 1.7% are working on sugar estates; 12.4% are employed as labourers; 10.9% as domestic servants, and 5.3% are described as "Independent," or "Proprietors," while among the general population only 4.8 are thus described.

5. A large proportion of the females of this class are employed, amounting to 36.2%, and no less than 4.2% are described as "Independent." The corresponding proportion among the females of the general population is only 1.2%.

6. That of the male Indians, 89.7% or nine-tenths, are employed; viz.  
On sugar estates - - - 79.2 %  
In other agricultural pursuits - - - 6.5 "  
As labourers - - - 5.0 "  
Servants - - - 4.8 "  
In commerce or manufactures - - - 2.6 "

7. Of these not employed, amounting to 10.3%, among which are included all those whose employment was not specified through omission, 10.1% are reported to be resident on sugar estates. As the proportion of male children under 15 in this class amounts to 7%, there remains but a very small proportion who have not some professed employment; and that it is not hawking, selling in shops, or other nominal occupations of that nature, is shown by the small proportion included under those heads.

8. Of the general population, 20.2% of the males are engaged in commerce and manufactures, 7% in agriculture, and the proportion in all the other branches is small; of the females very few have any employment.

In order to form a correct notion of the relative proportion of persons employed in other branches of agriculture, the class of independent proprietors, who in the country districts are almost all more or less engaged in agriculture, must be added to those classes under the latter head, and probably some portion of those classed as "labourers," who, from no distinction having been made, are placed under that head. These corrections may be made with the greater confidence, as the result will be to place the several districts in about the order in which experience would rank them. Port Louis is an exception, as the great mass of the labourers enumerated there were not employed in agriculture.

Of the total number, 841 belong to the general population, 796 are ex-apprentices, and 294 are Indians, of whom only 53 are fishermen.

6. Of the professional persons, amounting in all to 190, 135 reside in Port Louis; of the other educated persons, 1,186 out of 1,492 reside there. Of the Government civil servants, 419 out of 730 are stationed in Port Louis.

7. Of the domestic servants, exactly 60 out of 100 are employed in Port Louis.

29. Appendices No. 11 and 12 afford a condensed view of population employed on sugar estates in the whole colony, and in each district, the principal features of which have already been noticed.

30. The last Appendix exhibits an abstract of the number of insane, blind, deaf and dumb, and infirm. The latter two designations require explanation. The committee apprehend that among the "deaf" and "dumb" were not enumerated exclusively those who are labouring under the joint infirmity, but under either separately; and by "infirm" are meant those who by age or infirmity are rendered helpless or incompetent to labour, and have been thus described by the head of the family in which they reside. No statistical result can be drawn from the return of either of these classes; they are added, as they exhibit the minimum, at least, of patrics so affected. The proportion of insane and blind in each of the three principal classes, with regard to which only any inference can be fairly drawn, is as follows:—

No deduction can be drawn from the great difference exhibited in the proportion of the insane, between the Indian and the other two races, as the former consists of an entirely different class, chosen in India and chiefly in the prime of life.

The difference in the proportion of blind between the Creoles and Africans is remarkable but is probably owing to the circumstances attaching to the latter race, and particularly to the preponderance of elderly males among them.

31. Before concluding, the committee have to notice that this census was not extended to the dependencies of Mauritius, and to suggest that a census of the population in these islands should be taken; and further to recommend that a similar census should be taken at least every 10 years, and simultaneously in the colony and all its dependencies.

 EXTRACT of a DESPATCH from Governor Sir *W. M. Gomm*, K.C.B., to Earl *Grey*;  
 dated Mauritius, 27 September 1848.

My Lord,  
 (Received 14 December 1848.)  
 In my despatch, No. 217,\* of 16th instant, I reported to your Lordship some further proceedings of the Company calling itself the Mauritius Commercial Bank, having for their object the impeding of the measure for the establishment of a Government paper currency in the colony, and of eventually suspending it.  
 I continue my report upon the same subject.

2. Since concluding the despatch above cited, I have been furnished with the monthly state of the bank for August.

No similar communication, however, having been made to me since February, I requested the Colonial Secretary to call upon the direction for the states of the intervening periods; soliciting, at the same time, some explanation of the causes of such suspension.

3. The states were accordingly furnished by the learned President, but without explanatory notice or other reply of any kind accompanying.

4. I submit copies of these states to your Lordship, showing that for the last six months not a note has been issued for circulation by this Company, and such will be found to have been its actual position throughout the last two years.

5. Information having reached me from the most authentic sources, that while the bank left the Government wholly in the dark, with respect to any new resolutions it may have come to, measures were setting on foot by it of very questionable character and tendency, I addressed the Procureur and Advocate-general on the subject; and the correspondence which I have the honour to submit has resulted from my application.

\* \* \* \* \*  
 7. While penning this despatch, I am favoured by the president of the bank with his report of proceedings and resolutions come to at the two general meetings of shareholders on the 5th and 12th instant.

8. A copy of this communication I have also the honour to submit, conformity of the reports abroad, with respect to an intended issue by the bank of paper not convertible on demand, and revoking, as it would seem, even the conditions by which the bank has formerly consented to bind itself to Her Majesty's Government in its resolutions, submitted some time since, as acknowledged by it in the enclosure to my despatch, No. 181,\* of 15th July, the decision upon which conditional surrender is anxiously looked for by all parties.

9. But the question has assumed a new form within these last few days; the exposure of which has furnished me with additional confidence in the prudence of the course by which I have steadily held, waiting the ultimate decision of Her Majesty's Government in this matter; acting under a full impression that no subterfuge would be lost sight of for evading every condition subscribed to by the bank, short of final extinction of its power to circulate paper.

10. It is now maintained by a large and influential portion of members of this company, that the consent of a mere majority of shareholders is not sufficient to bind the bank corporation to forego a privilege that has been conferred upon it by a royal charter.
