1. INTRODUCTION


This issue of Economic and Social Indicators presents the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the year 2023. The methodology used for computing the CPI and the inflation rate is given in the technical note at Annex.

2. KEY POINTS

2.1 Overall CPI

The Consumer Price Index, which stood at 127.1 in December 2022, registered a net increase of 4.9 points (or +3.9%) to reach 132.0 in December 2023 (Table 1A).

The monthly CPI changes in 2023 are shown in the chart below. Increases ranging from 0.1 point to 2.0 points were noted during January to March, May to June, in August and during November to December, with the highest increase in February 2023. Decreases ranging from 0.1 point to 0.4 point were observed in April, July and during September to October, with the highest decrease in July 2023.



2.2 Overview of CPI movements


The main reasons for the net increase in CPI during the year 2023 (Table 2) were:

- (a) higher prices of vegetables, fish, culinary herbs, meat, fruits, frozen semi-prepared foods and some other food products;
- (b) higher prices of cigarettes, beer and stout and, rum and other cane spirits;
- (c) higher prices of ready-made clothing and footwear;
- (d) higher electricity rates and higher workman's wages;
- (e) higher charges for domestic services and higher prices of furniture and, washing materials and softeners;
- (f) higher doctor's fees and higher prices of medicinal products;
- (g) higher prices of motor vehicles and diesel;
- (h) higher prices of audio-visual equipment;
- (i) higher university fees in private institutions;

- (j) higher prices in prepared foods and higher expenditure in bar;
- (k) higher medical insurance;
- (l) higher prices of goods for personal care and, other goods and services; partly offset by
- (m) lower prices of cooking oil and powdered milk;
- (n) lower prices of gasolene.

3. MOVEMENT OF CPI SUB INDICES

Percentage change in CPI sub-indices for year 2023



The changes in the sub-indices (Table 3) for the twelve divisions of consumption expenditure during the year 2023 were as follows:

Division of consumption expenditure

Food and non-alcoholic beverages (+3.8%)

Alcoholic beverages and tobacco (+9.3%)

Clothing and footwear (+3.7%)

Main contributors to change

Higher prices of vegetables (+12.2%), fish (+6.4%), culinary herbs (+34.9%), meat (+1.8%), fruits (+3.5%), frozen semiprepared foods (+7.4%), other food products n.e.c (+8.8%),fruit juice (+18.9%) and cheese (+10.3%), partly offset by lower prices of cooking oil (-17.5%) and powdered milk (-2.4%).

Higher prices of cigarettes (+10.2%), beer and stout (+10.2%), rum and other cane spirits (+9.2%), whisky (+3.4%) and wine (+5.0%).

Higher prices of ready-made clothing (+2.9%) and footwear (+6.1%).

Housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels (+5.3%)

Furnishings, household equipment and routine household maintenance (+3.9%)

Health (+6.6%)

Transport (-0.8%)

Communication (-0.3%)

Recreation and culture (+3.6%)

Education (+4.5%)

Restaurants and hotels (+4.7%)

Miscellaneous goods and services (+3.8%)

Higher electricity rates (+14.2%), higher workman's wages (+8.6%), higher prices of materials for the maintenance and repairs of dwelling (+4.5%) and higher interest rates on housing loan (+0.3%).

Higher charges for domestic services (+15.3%) and higher prices of furniture (+3.9%), washing materials and softeners (+3.0%), household textiles (+3.5%), glassware (+4.5%) and some other non-durable supplies (+1.6%), partly offset by lower prices of some major household appliances (-2.5%).

Higher doctors' fees (+12.6%), higher prices of medicinal products (+4.1%) and higher clinic fees (+3.9%), partly offset by lower prices of some other medical products (-13.5%).

Lower prices of gasolene (-6.9%), partly mitigated by higher prices of motor vehicles (+3.1%), diesel (+17.2%) and air tickets (+2.1%),

Lower prices of mobile phones (-3.1%).

Higher prices of audio-visual equipment (+13.8%), books (+6.9%) and private TV subscriptions (+1.5%).

Higher university fees in private institutions (+5.6%), higher tertiary tuitions fees (+17.9%) and, higher fees in pre-primary (+2.4%), primary (+6.6%) and secondary (+5.8%) private schools.

Higher prices of prepared foods (+5.2%), higher expenditure in bar (+4.0%) and higher rates in hotel accommodation (+12.7%).

Higher medical insurance (+11.8%), higher prices for goods for personal care (+3.0%) and, higher charges for religious and funerary services (+9.3%).

4. INFLATION RATE

The headline inflation rate worked out to 7.0% in year 2023, compared to 10.8% in year 2022 (Table 5).

The headline inflation rate excluding 'Alcoholic beverages and tobacco' worked out to 6.6% in year 2023 compared to 11.0% in year 2022.

5. INTERNATIONAL COMPARISON OF INFLATION RATE

The table below compares the inflation rate (as measured by the percentage change in the average CPI for a given year relative to the previous year) of Mauritius with those of our main trading partners and some countries in the region for year 2022. It is to be noted that inflation rates for 2023 for the selected countries are not yet available.


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

Technical note

1. Methodology used for computation of Consumer Price Index

(Base period: January - December 2017 = 100)

(a) Definition

The **Consumer Price Index** (CPI) is an indicator of changes over time in the general level of prices of goods and services acquired by Mauritian consumers.

(b) Measurement of CPI

The CPI measures price change by comparing, through time, the cost of a fixed basket of goods and services. As prices vary over time, the total cost of the basket also changes and thus the CPI measures the change in the cost of this basket. It provides a way to compare what this basket costs at a given period relative to a reference or base period.

The cost of the CPI basket is assigned a value of 100 in the base period and the costs in other periods are expressed as percentage changes compared to the base period. For example, if the CPI is 110, this means that there has been an increase of 10% in the cost of the basket since the base year; similarly, an index of 90 means a 10% decrease in the cost of the basket.

(c) CPI basket

The CPI basket is based on the expenditures of private households in a reference period, currently January to December 2017. The composition of the current CPI basket has been derived from the 2017 Household Budget Survey (HBS) data. It has been determined in accordance with latest ILO and SADC recommendations.

The items constituting the basket have been selected on the basis of the importance of household consumption expenditure on them. The basket includes all important items on which consumption expenditure is significant, i.e. accounting for around 0.1% or more of total household consumption expenditure. Each item's relative importance, which is called the "weight" (usually expressed on a total of 1000), is the expenditure share of the item. Nonconsumption items such as income tax, social security contributions, purchase of land, shares and life insurance are excluded.

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The commodities in the basket are classified according to the UN COICOP (Classification of Consumption Expenditure according to Purpose) with 12 divisions, 42 groups and 80 classes.

(d) Price coverage

The prices used in the CPI calculation are those that any member of the public would have to pay

to purchase the specified goods or services. Any taxes on products attached to the goods are

included.

Price collection is done on a regular basis. Each month, around 8,000 price quotations are

collected in respect of 1,093 item indicators from some 520 outlets selected to be representative of

regions across the islands of Mauritius and Rodrigues.

Prices of non-perishable items are collected monthly in the nine geographical districts of the

island of Mauritius and in Rodrigues.

Prices of fresh fruits, vegetables, meat and fish are collected on a weekly basis from 9 markets in

Port Louis, Rose Hill, Quatre Bornes, Vacoas, Mahebourg, Flacq, Goodlands, Pamplemousses

and Port Mathurin.

Information on rent is obtained from a quarterly rent survey of some 100 rented dwellings.

(e) Formula for computation of CPI

The CPI is computed according to the Laspeyres Formula as a weighted average of price relatives

of individual items. The weights are fixed and correspond to the base period expenditures. The

Laspeyres Index measures the cost of a basket of goods and services at different points in time,

relative to the cost of the same basket in the base period.

The formula used for computing the CPI at time *t* is

The base period is January to December 2017, the period during which the latest HBS was conducted.

2. Inflation

(a) <u>Definition of Inflation</u>

Inflation is the percentage change in the level of prices (as measured by the CPI) from one period to another.

(b) Calculating the Inflation Rate

The headline inflation rate in Mauritius, like in many other countries, is calculated by using the annual average method, i.e. by comparing the average level of prices during a twelve-month period with the average level during the corresponding previous twelve-month period. This type of inflation rate is more appropriate for adjusting wages, salaries and pensions to compensate for loss of purchasing power. *All inflation rates presented in this publication relate to the headline inflation*.

Another commonly used method of calculating the inflation rate is the so called 'year-on-year' method. The year-on-year inflation rate is calculated as the percentage change in the CPI for a given month with respect to the CPI for the corresponding month of the previous year. It is generally used by central banks for monetary policy decisions. Year-on-year inflation rates are not presented in this publication but can be easily calculated through the available monthly CPI.
