## Labour force, Employment and Unemployment – Third quarter 2025

### Introduction

1. This issue of Economic and Social Indicators (ESI) presents a set of estimates of labour force, employment and unemployment for the third quarter of 2025, based on the results of the Continuous Multi-Purpose Household Survey (CMPHS) from July to September 2025. The estimates refer to the **Mauritian population aged 16 years and above**.
2. Annual estimates of labour force including foreign workers, derived after integrating data from the CMPHS with other data sources, are given at Annex 3.

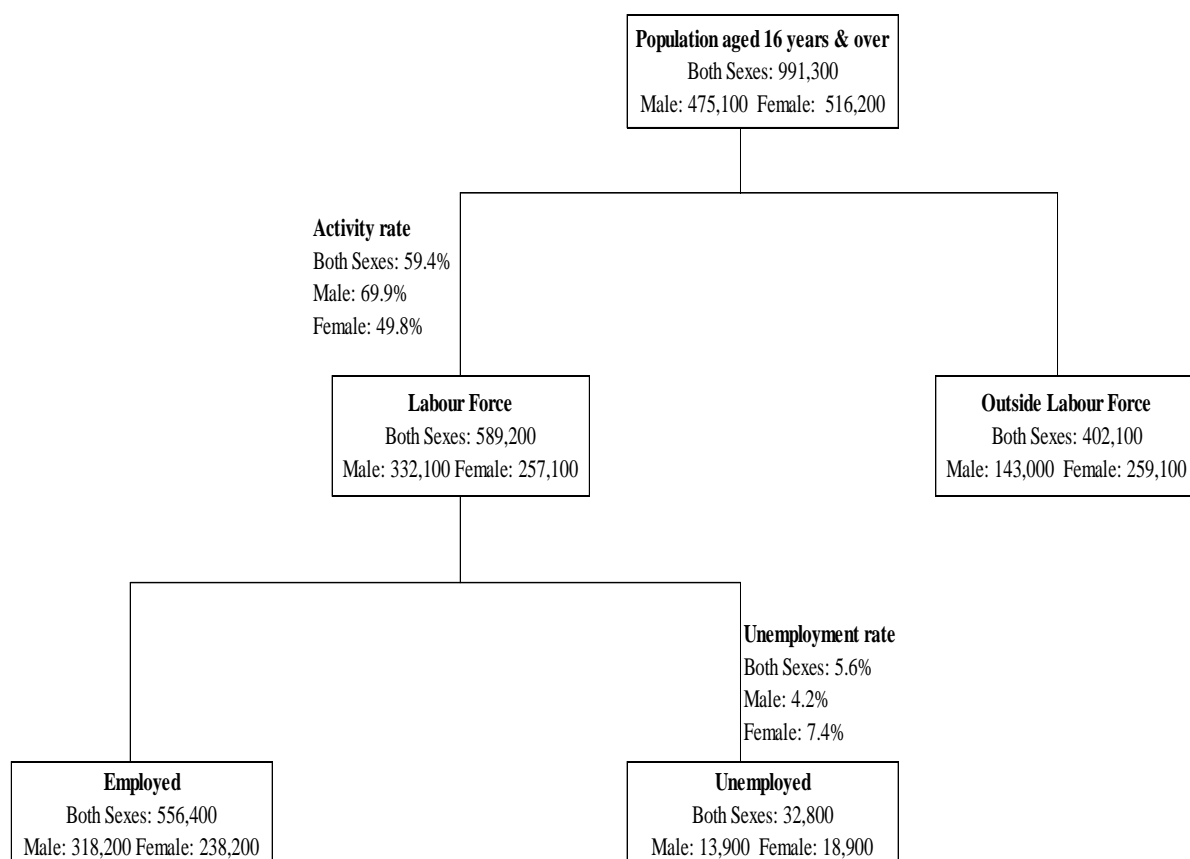

### Labour market overview, third quarter 2025

3. Compared to the corresponding quarter of 2024, the labour force has increased by 7,600. Employment increased by 9,000 while unemployment decreased by 1,400. The number of persons outside labour force decreased by 9,500 during the same period.
4. Compared to second quarter of 2025, labour force increased by 4,900 with a rise in employment (+6,300) and a fall in unemployment (-1,400). The number of persons outside labour force decreased by 7,700 during the same period.

The net change in employment level in the above table is equal to “Employment creations minus employment losses” during the period under reference.

- The activity rate for third quarter 2025 increased by 0.8 percentage point to 59.4% compared to the corresponding quarter of 2024. The male activity rate increased by 0.9 percentage point to 69.9% and the female activity rate increased by 0.9 percentage point to 49.8%.
- Compared to second quarter 2025, the activity rate increased by 0.6 percentage point. The male activity rate increased by 0.4 percentage point and the female activity rate increased by 1.0 percentage point.

7. From third quarter 2024 to third quarter 2025, employment increased by 9,000 to 556,400; both male and female employment increased by 2,200 and 6,800 respectively.

8. Compared to second quarter 2025, employment increased by 6,300; both male and female employment increased by 300 and 6,000 respectively.

9. From third quarter 2024 to third quarter 2025, the number of unemployed persons decreased by 1,400. Male unemployment increased by 200 and female unemployment decreased by 1,600.

10. The unemployment rate decreased by 0.3 percentage point from 5.9% in third quarter 2024 to 5.6% in third quarter 2025. Male unemployment rate remained unchanged at 4.2% and female unemployment rate decreased by 0.7 percentage point to 7.4%.

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter 2025 to 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter 2025

11. When compared to second quarter 2025, the total number of unemployed persons decreased by 1,400, with decreases of 300 among males and 1,100 among females.
12. Total unemployment rate decreased by 0.3 percentage point from 5.9% in the second quarter of 2025 to 5.6% in the third quarter of 2025. Male unemployment rate decreased by 0.1 percentage point from 4.3% to 4.2% and female unemployment rate decreased by 0.5 percentage point from 7.9% to 7.4%.

13. At the third quarter of 2025, unemployed youth aged 16 to 24 years was estimated at 11,100 (5,100 males and 6,000 females) compared to 12,800 (6,300 males and 6,500 females) at the previous quarter and 11,700 (5,300 males and 6,400 females) at the third quarter of 2024.
14. The youth unemployment rate decreased in the third quarter of 2025 to 17.1% from 17.7% in the corresponding quarter of 2024. During the same period, the rate for young men decreased by 0.7 percentage point to 14.3%, and that for young women decreased by 0.3 percentage point to 20.5%.
15. Compared to second quarter 2025, the youth unemployment rate decreased from 20.1% to 17.1%, with decreases of 3.9 percentage points for young men and 1.8 percentage points for young women.

## **Characteristics of the unemployed as at third quarter 2025**

16. The main characteristics of the unemployed as at third quarter 2025 were as follows:

- (i) The 32,800 unemployed comprised 13,900 males (42%) and 18,900 females (58%).
- (ii) Around 17,900 (55%) of the unemployed were single; males (73%) and females (41%).
- (iii) Some 15,100 (46%) of the unemployed did not have the Cambridge School Certificate (SC) or equivalent and among them 3,000 had not even passed the Primary School Achievement Certificate (PSAC)/Certificate of Primary Education (CPE) or equivalent.
- (iv) Around 26,800 (82%) had been looking for work for up to one year and the remaining 6,000 (18%) for more than one year.
- (v) About 23,200 (71%) had working experience and 9,600 (29%) were looking for a first job.
- (vi) Around 14,400 (44%) were registered at the Employment Service Information Centre.
- (vii) There were 5,400 (16%) young persons aged 16 to 24 years, not yet married and looking for a first job. Some 3,100 possessed a qualification below SC.
- (viii) Some 3,400 or 10% of the unemployed were heads of households.
- (ix) Around 5,400 (16%) lived in households with no employed persons.

## **Seasonally adjusted unemployment rate**

17. Seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for the third quarter of 2025 was 5.7%, lower than the rate of 6.0% at the corresponding quarter of 2024 but higher than the rate of 5.6% at the previous quarter.

## **Population outside Labour Force**

- 18. The number of persons aged 16 years and over, not forming part of the labour force (inactive population) was estimated at 402,100 at the third quarter of 2025 compared to 409,800 in the second quarter of 2025 and 411,600 in the third quarter of 2024.
- 19. The population outside labour force comprised 143,000 males and 259,100 females. Among males, around 59% were retired/old persons and 24% were students. Among females, 50% were homemakers and 25% were retired/old persons.

## **Reliability of the Labour Force estimates**

20. The estimates in this publication are based on the results of a sample survey and are thus subject to sample variability. Standard errors (SE) and coefficient of variation (CV) give an indication of this variability. The standard error of the estimates and the coefficient of variation (SE/estimate) are given in the table that follows.

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## **NOTES**

### **Release of Labour Force data**

Labour Force statistics are compiled and published in the “Economic and Social Indicators” in March, June, September and December according to an advance calendar posted on the website of Statistics Mauritius (<https://statsmauritius.govmu.org>). This issue provides data for the third quarter 2025 compared to the previous quarter and to the same quarter a year ago.

### **The CMPHS methodology**

#### **Data collection**

Following the COVID-19 outbreak in March 2020, the face-to-face interviews of household members were replaced by telephone interviews. As from January 2023, face-to-face interviews have been resumed.

#### **Frequency of data collection**

As from 2005, data collection is carried out monthly except in 2020 after the COVID-19 outbreak of in March 2020, it was carried out only in May, June, July, September, October and December 2020.

The reference week is the second week of the survey month so that quarterly estimates can be published within the quarter following the reference quarter, as required by the IMF Special Data Dissemination System (SDDS) to which the country has graduated on 28 February 2012.

#### **Scope and coverage of collection**

All private Mauritian households in the islands of Mauritius and Rodrigues are covered.

#### **Sampling method**

A stratified two-stage sampling design is used. At the first stage, Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) are selected in proportion to square root of the total number of households in the geographical district. Prior to 2005, the first stage stratification factors were urban, semi urban and rural geographical locations. As from 2005, the Relative Development Index (RDI) is used as the spatial stratification factor. This index is based on 12 variables encompassing housing and living conditions, literacy and education, and employment. As from 2023, in order to improve the variance estimates, RDI boundaries have been reviewed such that each geographical district has four even strata. For this exercise, the 2022 Housing and Population Census results have been used.

At the second stage, stratification criteria are community, household size and average monthly expenditure of the household. From 2005 to 2022, 10 households were selected from each selected PSU in Islands of Mauritius and Rodrigues. However, as from 2023 the number of households selected for each PSU in Island of Rodrigues have been increased from

10 to 15 while that of Island of Mauritius has remained the same. It is to be noted that the sample size has remained unchanged.

### **Sample size**

From 1999 to 2003, around 6,500 households were covered each year. In 2004, the sample was increased to 8,640 so that reliable quarterly estimates of labour force, employment and unemployment could be worked out. As from 2005, the sample for the year has been further increased to 11,280. Furthermore, in order to measure quarterly changes, 50% of the households sampled in a quarter are re-interviewed in the following quarter; for example, 50% of the households sampled in the first quarter of 2005 have been re-interviewed in the second quarter of 2005.

### **Questionnaire**

The CMPHS questionnaire comprises three modules: (a) a basic module common to all rounds of the survey covering the general characteristics of the population (b) a second module covering labour force with in-depth investigation and a core set of questions which are kept constant at all rounds of the survey and (c) a third module grouping other topics of interest but investigated in less details.

### **Estimation and reliability of results**

Estimates worked out from a household survey data are inevitably subject to sampling variability since they are based on information collected from only a sample of households rather than from all households. Standard errors and coefficient of variation for the main labour force estimates are given in this report.

## **LABOUR MARKET INDICATORS, CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS**

### **1. Household**

A household is defined as either a person living on his/her own or a group of two or more persons, who may or may not be related, but who live together and make common provision for food and other essentials for living.

The following labour market indicators are based on the recommendations of the International Labour Organisation.

### **2. Employment**

Employed population consists of Mauritians aged 16 years and above who have worked for pay, profit or family gain for at least one hour during the reference week of a month. It includes those who are temporarily absent from work for reasons such as leave with pay, leave without pay and temporary disorganisation of work (bad weather, break down of equipment, lack of order, etc.).

It is to be noted that as from year 2007, labour force estimates are based on population aged 16 years and above, following the amendment to the Labour Act in December 2006 whereby the minimum legal working age is 16 years, and the subsequent recommendation by the ILO to be in line with the amended Labour Act.

### **3. Unemployment**

Unemployed population comprises all Mauritians aged 16 years and above who are not working but who are looking for work and are available for work during the reference period.

### **4. Labour force**

Labour force or active population is made up of employed and unemployed population.

### **5. Unemployment rate**

Unemployment rate is the ratio (%) of unemployment to labour force.

### **6. Outside the Labour Force (previously known as inactive population)**

Outside the labour force includes all Mauritians aged 16 years and above, not forming part of the labour force for reasons such as attendance at educational institutions, engagement in household duties, retirement, old age and infirmity/disablement.

### **7. Activity rate**

Activity rate is the ratio (%) of labour force to population aged 16 years and above.

## **8. Employment Status:**

### ***Employer***

An employer is a person who operates his/her own business or trade and hires one or more employees

### ***Own account worker***

An Own account worker is a person who operates his/her own business or trade but does not hire employees. He/She may be working alone or with the help of contributing family workers.

### ***Employee***

An Employee is a person who works for pay for someone else, even in a temporary capacity.

### ***Apprentice***

An Apprentice is a person being trained for a job or trade and is paid.

### ***Contributing family worker***

A Contributing family worker is a person who works without pay in an enterprise operated by a family member.

## **9. Educational attainment**

*Primary:* comprises persons who have studied from Grade 1 (Standard 1) to Grade 6 (Standard 6) or to Primary School Achievement Certificate (PSAC)/Certificate of Primary Education (CPE) or equivalent.

*Secondary:* comprises persons who have studied from Grade 7 (Form 1) to Grade 13 (Form 6) or to Higher School Certificate (HSC) or equivalent.

*Tertiary:* comprises persons who in addition to their secondary educational certificates (SC and HSC or equivalent) also possess either a certificate/diploma (which is above the HSC but below a first degree) or a degree.

**Note:**

1. The above figures have been worked out in order to give a set of comparable labour force estimates obtained from different sources. Users are cautioned in the use of these figures given that there are differences related to the reference period, coverage and methodology. The different sources from which these estimates have been obtained are as follows:

- i CMPHS for Mauritian labour force estimates which are subject to sampling variability as mentioned at Annex 1.
- ii The Annual Survey of Employment and Earnings (SEE) in large establishments carried out in March of each year. Employment figures refer to jobs in large establishments employing 10 or more persons and include both Mauritians and foreign workers.
- iii Employment in 'other than large' establishments has been estimated after reconciling data from CMPHS, SEE and administrative sources.

2. The labour force, employment and unemployment estimates are based on population figures revised according to the 2022 Population Census results.
