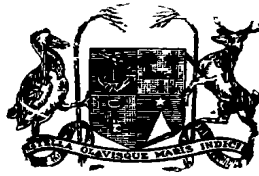

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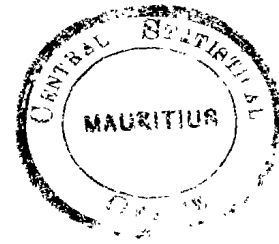

FOREWORD

This volume constitutes the part of the report on the 1952 Census dealing with certain educational, occupational, economic and social characteristics of the population.

The facts disclosed by the investigation are set out barely in the tables with only brief explanatory notes.

The recommendations of the various Statistical and Population Commissions of the United Nations have been adhered to as far as feasible. In particular, the occupational and industrial distributions of the population have been worked out in strict accordance with the International Standard Industrial Classification of all economic activities (ISIC) and with the International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO).

The principal tabular statements are for the Mauritian population. Corresponding data for the dependency of Rodrigues are given separately in the Appendix to the main text.

X. Languages of the Population

Owing to the great diversity of languages and dialects spoken currently in Mauritius by its various ethnical groups, it has been found more convenient for classification to separate them in two broad categories: the European languages and the non-European ones.

In the second category, Creole has been quoted as a language, although it is essentially a local vernacular, derived originally from the French and almost peculiar to Mauritius alone. The Creole language, however, assumes in Mauritius and its dependencies a great importance, as will be gathered from the proportion of the population in all ethnical groups making current use of it.

Tabular statements are given for mother tongue, the language currently spoken and any additional language occasionally spoken.

The declarations on the Census returns were based on the following definition of mother tongue viz: that it referred to the "language spoken in the individual's home in his early childhood."

XI. Educational Characteristics of the Population

Literacy of the population.—This, according to accepted international definition, is the ability to read and write in *any* language. The tabular statements given here are based on the declarations made in the original Census returns.

Here, again, it has been found more convenient to classify separately the literacy in European languages and the literacy in non-European ones.

In the first category, the classification has been restricted to English, French and Other European, as the small numbers obtained for languages other than the first two do not warrant publication in greater detail.

In the second category, a greater variety of the Oriental languages or dialects had to be specified by reason of their relative importance in current usage.

* This tabulation comprises only persons aged 3 years or more.

The lower age limit for literacy has been taken at 5 years' which is the usual first age of attendance to a primary school; the first age group is accordingly carried from 5 years to 11 years inclusive.

The number of illiterates quoted in this tabulation are definitely those persons in each group who declared that they could neither read nor write. The remainder, however, does not necessarily comprise the "literate" only, according to the above definition; there is also included in this difference a number of "semi-literate" or "partially literate" persons, i.e., persons who can read but cannot write.

Educational Level.—With the exception of the “lower primary” category, this classification refers only to the highest educational level which had actually been attained by the person at the date of census.

In respect of persons classified under “lower primary”, the numbers comprise those who are actually receiving as well as those who have received a lower primary education but may not, in the case of lower age groups, have yet completed that stage of their education.

The lower age limit for which the tabulations have been prepared is again 5 years, the usual age of entrance in a primary school.

Industrial Status of the gainful population.—The Industrial Status of the economically active population is given in the next table.

It will be observed that in the General Group of the population and still more in the Indo-Mauritian Group, the far greater numbers of workers are on day employment, whereas in the Chinese Group, the monthly employed by far predominate.

By definition, a 'worker on own account' is a person who operates an economic enterprise without employees. This conception has been complied with in spite of the tendency for some employers to classify themselves as "worker on own account".

XIV. Private Households in Mauritius

The number and size of private households are given in Table XXVIII for each rural district and for each town, by ethnical group and sex of the head of the household. The size of the household is measured by the actual number of persons living under the roof of the household and socially dependent on him. Under the denomination of "dependents" were comprised: brothers and sisters; nephews and nieces; cousins; sons and daughters, step sons and step daughters; adopted children. To this list were also included grandsons and grand daughters in cases where these had no father or mother living under that roof.

It emerges from the tabular statements that the proportion of households living in the urban areas as compared with the number living in the rural areas vary considerably from one ethnical group to another. In the General Group, the number of households in the rural areas is not very different from the number living in the urban areas; but as regards the Indo-Mauritian Group, the proportion is much greater; more than three times as many households live in the rural areas. In the Chinese Group, the reverse is the case; more than twice as many Chinese households are found in the towns than in the rural districts.

From the ages of 20 onwards, infertility is highest among the General population and lowest among the Chinese.

Table XXXI gives in the second column, the total number of children born to mothers classified in 5-year age groups, with, in the opposite column, the number of children which were stated to be alive by these same mothers. The difference, i.e. the children who died, has been expressed as a percentage of the number born.

It should be noted that a small number of mothers who did not state their number of children, have been left out of this tabulation. They add up for the General group: 688 (1·9 per cent); for the Indo-Mauritian group: 1,857 (2·2 per cent) and for the Chinese group: 38 (1·3 per cent).
