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## EXPORT PROCESSING ZONE - 2ND QUARTER 1989

### 1. Introduction

This issue of the Economic Indicators presents data on employment and trade in the enterprises engaged in the Export Processing Zone as at the end of June 1989, together with a forecast of its imports and exports for the year 1989.

### 2. Employment evolution during 2nd quarter 1989

The second quarter of 1989 witnessed the coming into operation of 11 new EPZ enterprises, while at the same time, 7 enterprises ceased operation, of which 4 temporarily. Further 2 other firms demanded revocation of their EPZ status. The total number of enterprises in the EPZ therefore stood at 575 as at the end of June 1989, almost the same as at the end of March 1989 when it was 573. The level of employment also remained at about the same level as the previous quarter, at 89,300.

A detailed analysis shows that about 350 jobs were created by the new firms. With a contribution of some 3,400 additional jobs from 34 existing firms, the total employment creation during the 2nd quarter reached 3,750. This was however offset by an employment loss of the same order, resulting from the laying-off of some 3,100 workers by 29 enterprises contracting their activities and 650 by the 7 companies which have ceased operating.

### 3. Employment as at end of June 1989

After reaching as high a level as 91,600 in June 1988, employment in the EPZ sector seems to be settling down at slightly above the 89,000 line. In June 1989, with males numbering around 29,800 and females, 59,500, total employment amounted to nearly 89,300, most of which (over 85%) was in the wearing apparel sector.

One feature being observed lately in the EPZ sector is the decline in male employment while females are still in good demand. Thus while a net decrease of 500 males was almost offset by some 485 additional female recruits during the second quarter, comparison with the situation in June 1988 shows a total loss of 2,500 male employment, only slightly mitigated by some 200 new female recruits.

Most of this decrease in employment was in the woollens subsector, which over the period June 1988 - June 1989, laid off 4,900 employees as well as nearly 500 outworkers. Over 2,100 of these were, however, made up for by the other textile subsectors (Textile yarn and fabrics: + 650 and other garments: + 1,500). The jewellery and leather products sectors together recruited an additional 600.

#### 4. Exports & Imports

For the first half of 1989, the enterprises operating in the EPZ sector have exported goods for a value of over 4,400 Rs million as against an import of raw materials valued around 3,700 Rs million. The figures of 1988 for the same period were of the order of 3,616 Rs million for exports and 2,927 Rs million for imports.

From data available, it is estimated that the exports of the EPZ may well approach the 10,000 Rs million mark, while its imports could exceed 7,000 Rs million.
