Labour force, Employment and Unemployment – Second quarter 2015

Introduction

- 1. This issue of Economic and Social Indicators (ESI) presents a set of estimates of labour force, employment and unemployment for the second quarter of 2015, based on the results of the Continuous Multi-Purpose Household Survey (CMPHS) from April to June 2015. The estimates refer to the Mauritian population aged 16 years and above.
- 2. Annual estimates of labour force including foreign workers derived after integrating data from CMPHS with other sources are given at Annex 3.



Labour market overview, second quarter 2015

- 3. Compared with the corresponding quarter of 2014, there has been an increase in the labour force (+16,200) with increases in both employment (+14,700) and unemployment (+1,500).
- 4. Compared with the previous quarter, labour force increased by 9,200 with an increase in employment (+13,500) and a decrease in unemployment (-4,300).

Labour force participation

- 5. The activity rate for the second quarter 2015 was 60.8%, up by 1.1 percentage points from 59.7% in the corresponding quarter one year earlier. The activity rate for male decreased by -0.5 percentage point to 75.0% while that for female increased by 2.8 percentage point to 47.3%.
- 6. Compared with the previous quarter, the activity rate increased to 60.8% by 0.8 percentage point. The male activity rate increased by 0.8 percentage point from 74.2% to 75.0% and female rate as well increased by 0.8 percentage point from 46.5% to 47.3%.


Employment

- 7. From second quarter 2014 to second quarter 2015, employment increased by 14,700 to 542,600; male employment increased by 1,700 to 335,900 and female employment by 13,000 to 206,700.
- 8. Compared with the previous quarter, employment increased by 13,500 with increases of 9,900 in male employment and 3,600 in female employment.

Unemployment

- 9. From second quarter 2014 to second quarter 2015, the number of unemployed persons increased by 1,500 to 46,000. Male unemployment decreased by 1,700 while female unemployment increased by 3,200.
- 10. The unemployment rate remained unchanged at 7.8% for the second quarter 2015 compared to the second quarter 2014. However, male unemployment rate decreased by 0.5 percentage point to 5.1% while female unemployment rate increased by 0.6 percentage point to 11.9%.
- 11. When compared with the first quarter of 2015, the total number of unemployed persons decreased by 4,300. Among males there was a decrease of 5,300 whilst, among females there was an increase of 1,000.
- 12. From first quarter 2015 to second quarter 2015, the unemployment rate decreased by 0.9 percentage point with a decrease of 1.6 percentage points among males and an increase of 0.2 percentage point among females.

- 13. Seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for the second quarter of 2015 was 7.4%, lower than the rate of 8.1% for the first quarter 2015 but at the same rate as the second quarter of 2014.
- 14. At the second quarter 2015, youth unemployed aged 16 to 24 years numbered 19,700 (9,400 males and 10,300 females) compared 23,300 (11,200 males and 12,100 females) at the previous quarter and 18,800 (with males and females at parity) at the corresponding quarter 2014.
- 15. The main characteristics of the unemployed as at second quarter 2015 were as follows:
 - (i) The 46,000 unemployed comprised 18,200 males (40%) and 27,800 females (60%).
 - (ii) Around 26,500 (58%) of the unemployed were single. Among males, the majority (77%) was single while among females, more than half (55%) was ever married.
 - (iii) Some 4,900 or 11% had not reached the Certificate of Primary Education (CPE) level or equivalent and a further 15,500 (34%) did not have the Cambridge School Certificate (SC) or equivalent.
 - (iv) Around 31,500 (68%) had been looking for work for up to one year and the remaining 14,500 (32%) for more than one year.
 - (v) About 33,600 (73%) had working experience and 12,400 (27%) were looking for a job for the first time.
 - (vi) Around 19,400 (42%) were registered at the Employment Service.
 - (vii) There were 8,900 (19%) young persons aged 16 to 24 years, not yet married and looking for a first job. Some 3,400 (38%) of them had not passed SC.
 - (viii) Ever married (including widowed, divorced or separated) unemployed persons aged 25 to 44 years and having worked before numbered 10,600. Among them, about 5,900 (56%) had not passed SC.
 - (ix) 5,500 or 12% of the unemployed were heads of households.
 - (x) 6,500 (14%) lived in households with no employed persons.

Economically inactive population

- 16. The number of persons aged 16 years and over, not forming part of the labour force (inactive population) was estimated at 379,800 at the second quarter 2015.
- 17. The inactive population was made up of 118,300 males and 261,500 females. Among inactive males, around 46% were 'retired or old persons' and 33% were students. Among females, 55% were homemakers; 16% were students and 18% were 'retired or old persons'.

Sampling errors

- 18. The estimates in this publication are based on the results of a sample survey and are thus subject to sample variability. Standard errors and confidence intervals give an indication of this variability.
- 19. The standard error of the estimates and the 95% confidence interval which represent a 95% chance that the true value lies within that interval, are given in the tables that follow.





Chart 3: Employment by quarter, 2^{nd} quarter $2011 - 2^{nd}$ quarter 2015

Chart 4: Unemployment rate by quarter, 2nd quarter 2011 – 2nd quarter 2015






Chart 5: Activity rate by quarter, 2nd quarter 2011 – 2nd quarter 2015

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NOTES

Release of Labour Force data

Labour Force statistics are compiled and published in the "Economic and Social Indicators" in March, June, September and December according to an advance calendar posted on the website of Statistics Mauritius (http://statsmauritius.gov.mu). This issue provides data for the second quarter 2015 compared to the same quarter a year ago.

However, where appropriate, historical series are also provided for the main indicators.

The CMPHS Survey methodology

Data collection

Face to face interviews of household members are carried out by qualified interviewers recruited by the office.

Frequency of data collection

Data collection is carried out monthly except in 2004 when it was carried out every quarter. Up to 2005, the reference period for data on labour force was the last week of the survey month. As from 2006, the reference week has been changed to the second week of the survey month so that estimates can be published within one quarter of the reference period, as required by the IMF Special Data Dissemination System (SDDS) to which the country has graduated on 28 February 2012.

Scope and coverage of collection

All private Mauritian households in the islands of Mauritius and Rodrigues are covered.

Sampling method

A Stratified two-stage sampling design is used. At the first stage, Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) are selected with probability proportional to size and at the second stage, a fixed number of households is selected from each selected PSU.

Prior to 2005, the first stage stratification factors were urban, semi urban and rural geographical locations. As from 2005, the Relative Development Index (RDI) is used as the spatial stratification factor. This index is based on 12 variables encompassing housing and living conditions, literacy and education, and employment derived from the 2011 Housing and Population Census to rank PSUs. A set of RDIs for administrative regions has been published in the series "Economic and Social Indicators" - Issue No. 977.

The second stage stratification criteria are community, household size and average monthly expenditure of the household.

Sample size

From 1999 to 2003, around 6,500 households were covered each year. In 2004, the sample was increased to 8,640 so that reliable quarterly estimates of labour force, employment and unemployment could be worked out. As from 2005, the sample for the year has been further increased to 11,280. Furthermore, in order to measure quarterly changes, 50% of the households sampled in a quarter are re-interviewed in the following quarter; for example, 50% of the households sampled in the first quarter of 2005 have been re-interviewed in the second quarter of 2005.

Questionnaire

The CMPHS questionnaire comprises three modules: a basic module common to all rounds of the survey covering the general characteristics of the population (b) a second module covering labour force with in-depth investigation and a core set of questions which are kept constant at all rounds of the survey and (c) a third module grouping other topics of interest but investigated in less details.

Estimation and reliability of results

Estimates worked out from household survey data are inevitably subject to sampling variability since they are based on information collected from only a sample of households rather than from all households. The Standard Error (S.E) which is a measure of this variability, used to set confidence intervals for any estimate (whether a total or a rate) derived from the sample. For example, a 95% confidence interval indicates that there is 95% chance that the upper and lower limits of the interval enclose the true value (which would be obtained if all households had been surveyed). Standard errors and confidence intervals are calculated for the main labour force estimates.

Definitions

Household

A household is defined as either a person living on his/her own or a group of two or more persons, who may or may not be related, but who live together and make common provision for food and other essentials for living.

Employment

Employed population consists of Mauritians aged 16 years and above (16+) who have worked for pay, profit or family gain for at least one hour during the reference week of a month. It includes those who are temporarily absent from work for reasons such as leave with pay, leave without pay and temporary disorganisation of work (bad weather, break down of equipment, lack of order, etc.).

It is to be noted that as from year 2007, labour force estimates are based on population aged 16 years and above, following the amendment to the Labour Act in December 2006 whereby the minimum legal working age is 16 years, and the subsequent recommendation by the ILO to be in line with the amended Labour Act.

Unemployment

Unemployed population comprises all Mauritians aged 16+ who are not working but who are looking for work and are available for work during the reference period.

Labour force

Labour force or active population is made up of employed and unemployed population.

Unemployment rate

Unemployment rate is the ratio (%) of unemployment to labour force.

Inactive population

Inactive population includes all Mauritians aged 16+ years, not forming part of the labour force for reasons such as attendance at educational institutions, engagement in household duties, retirement, old age and infirmity/disablement.

Activity rate

Activity rate is the ratio (%) of labour force to population aged 16+ (active and inactive population).

Employer

An employer is a person who operates his/her own business or trade and hires one or more employees.

Own account worker

An Own account worker is a person who operates his/her own business or trade but does not hire employees. He/She may be working alone or with the help of contributing family workers.

Employee

An Employee is a person who works for pay for someone else, even in a temporary capacity.

Apprentice

An Apprentice is a person being trained for a job or trade and does not receive pay or may just receive some pocket money; an apprentice is considered as an employee.

Contributing family worker

A Contributing family worker is a person who works without pay in an enterprise operated by a family member.

Educational attainment

Primary: comprises persons who have studied up to a "Standard" between Standard 1 and the Certificate of Primary Education (CPE) or equivalent.

Secondary: comprises persons who have studied up to a "Form" between Form 1 and the Higher School Certificate (HSC) or equivalent.

Tertiary: comprises persons who in addition to their secondary educational certificates (SC and HSC or equivalent) also possess either a certificate/diploma (which is above the HSC but below a first degree) or a degree.
