${\bf Labour\ force,\ Employment\ and\ Unemployment-Second\ quarter\ 2019}$ Introduction

- 1. This issue of Economic and Social Indicators (ESI) presents a set of estimates of labour force, employment and unemployment for the second quarter of 2019, based on the results of the Continuous Multi-Purpose Household Survey (CMPHS) from April to June 2019. The estimates refer to the Mauritian population aged 16 years and above.
- 2. Annual estimates of labour force including foreign workers derived after integrating data from CMPHS with other sources are given at Annex 3.



Labour market overview, second quarter 2019

- 3. Compared with the corresponding quarter of 2018, there has been an increase in the labour force (+10,900), with a rise in employment (+12,300) and a fall in unemployment (-1,400). The number of persons outside labour force decreased by 6,200 during the same period.
- 4. Compared with the previous quarter, labour force increased by 6,500 with an increase in employment (+7,800) and a fall in unemployment (-1,300). The number of persons outside labour force decreased by 4,000 during the same period.

5. The activity rate for second quarter 2019 rose by 0.8 percentage point to 59.5% from 58.7% in the corresponding quarter one year earlier. The male activity rate increased by 0.7 percentage point to 73.1% and the female rate increased by 0.9 percentage point to 46.6%.

6. Compared to the previous quarter, the activity rate increased by 0.5 percentage point. The male activity rate increased by 0.1 percentage point from 73.0% to 73.1% and the female activity rate increased by 0.9 percentage point from 45.7% to 46.6%.

- 7. From second quarter 2018 to second quarter 2019, employment increased by 12,300 to 553,800; both male and female employment increased by 9,700 and 2,600 respectively.
- 8. Compared to the previous quarter, employment increased by 7,800; both male and female employment increased by 5,400 and 2,400 respectively.

- 9. From second quarter 2018 to second quarter 2019, the number of unemployed persons decreased by 1,400; male unemployment decreased by 5,100 while female unemployment increased by 3,700.
- 10. The unemployment rate decreased by 0.4 percentage point from 7.0% in second quarter 2018 to 6.6% in second quarter 2019. Male unemployment rate decreased by 1.5 percentage points to 3.8% while female unemployment rate increased by 1.3 percentage point to 10.8%.

1st Quarter 2019 to 2nd Quarter 2019

- 11. When compared with the first quarter of 2019, the total number of unemployed persons decreased by 1,300 with a decrease of 4,000 among males and an increase of 2,700 among females.
- 12. From first quarter 2019 to second quarter 2019, the unemployment rate decreased by 0.3 percentage point from 6.9% to 6.6%. Male unemployment rate decreased by 1.1 percentage points from 4.9% to 3.8% while female unemployment rate increased by 0.9 percentage point from 9.9% to 10.8%.

- 13. At the second quarter 2019, unemployed youth aged 16 to 24 years numbered 16,100 (6,100 males and 10,000 females) compared to 18,200 (8,100 males and 10,100 females) at the previous quarter and 21,500 (10,900 males and 10,600 females) at the corresponding quarter of 2018.
- 14. The youth unemployment rate decreased from 27.5% to 21.3% in the second quarter of 2019 when compared to the corresponding quarter one year earlier. During the

- same period, the youth unemployment rate for male decreased by 11.4 percentage points to 14.3% while female youth unemployment rate increased by 0.7 percentage point to 30.3%.
- 15. Compared to the previous quarter, the youth unemployment rate decreased from 23.4% to 21.3% with decreases of 4.0 percentage points in the male youth unemployment rate while female youth unemployment rate increased by 0.2 percentage point.

Characteristics of the unemployed as at second quarter 2019

- 16. The main characteristics of the unemployed as at second quarter 2019 were as follows:
 - (i) The 39,100 unemployed comprised 13,400 males (34%) and 25,700 females (66%).
 - (ii) Around 22,200 (57%) of the unemployed were single. Among males, the majority (75%) was single compared to 47% among the females.
 - (iii) Some 4,300 or 11% had not reached the Certificate of Primary Education (CPE) level or equivalent and a further 14,100 (36%) did not have the Cambridge School Certificate (SC) or equivalent.
 - (iv) Around 30,200 (77%) had been looking for work for up to one year and the remaining 8,900 (23%) for more than one year.
 - (v) About 28,600 (73%) had working experience and 10,500 (27%) were looking for a job for the first time.
 - (vi) Around 16,500 (42%) were registered at the Employment Service Information Centre.
 - (vii) There were 8,700 (22%) young persons aged 16 to 24 years, not yet married and looking for a first job. Some 3,600 (41%) of them possessed a qualification below SC.
 - (viii) 4,400 or 11% of the unemployed were heads of households.
 - (ix) 6,200 (16%) lived in households with no employed persons.

Seasonally adjusted unemployment rate

17. Seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for the second quarter of 2019 was 6.3%, lower than the rates of 6.7% and 6.4% at the corresponding quarter of 2018 and at the previous quarter respectively.

Population outside Labour Force

- 18. The number of persons aged 16 years and over, not forming part of the labour force (inactive population) was estimated at 403,400 at the second quarter 2019 compared to 407,400 in the previous quarter and 409,600 in the corresponding quarter of 2018.
- 19. The population outside labour force comprised 130,600 males and 272,800 females. Among inactive males, around 48% were 'retired or old persons' and 29% were students. Among females, 57% were homemakers; 18% were 'retired or old persons' and 15% were 'students'.

20. Based on CMPHS data for 2018 and first semester of 2019, forecasts of employment and unemployment for 2019 are as follows:

Sampling errors

- 21. The estimates in this publication are based on the results of a sample survey and are thus subject to sample variability. Standard errors and confidence intervals give an indication of this variability.
- 22. The standard error of the estimates and the 95% confidence interval which represent a 95% chance that the true value lies within that interval, are given in the tables that follow.

Chart 2: Employment by quarter, 2nd quarter 2015 – 2nd quarter 2019




Chart 3: Unemployment rate by quarter, 2nd quarter 2015 – 2nd quarter 2019





Chart 4: Activity rate by quarter, 2nd quarter 2015 – 2nd quarter 2019

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NOTES

Release of Labour Force data

Labour Force statistics are compiled and published in the "Economic and Social Indicators" in March, June, September and December according to an advance calendar posted on the website of Statistics Mauritius (http://statsmauritius.govmu.org). This issue provides data for the second quarter 2019 compared to the previous quarter and to the same quarter a year ago.

However, where appropriate, historical series are also provided for the main indicators.

The CMPHS Survey methodology

Data collection

Face to face interviews of household members are carried out by qualified interviewers recruited by the office.

Frequency of data collection

Data collection is carried out monthly except in 2004 when it was carried out every quarter. Up to 2005, the reference period for data on labour force was the last week of the survey month. As from 2006, the reference week has been changed to the second week of the survey month so that estimates can be published within one quarter of the reference period, as required by the IMF Special Data Dissemination System (SDDS) to which the country has graduated on 28 February 2012.

Scope and coverage of collection

All private Mauritian households in the islands of Mauritius and Rodrigues are covered.

Sampling method

A Stratified two-stage sampling design is used. At the first stage, Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) are selected in proportion to square root of the total number of households in the geographical district and at the second stage a fixed number of households is selected from each selected PSU.

Prior to 2005, the first stage stratification factors were urban, semi urban and rural geographical locations. As from 2005, the Relative Development Index (RDI) is used as the spatial stratification factor. This index is based on 12 variables encompassing housing and living conditions, literacy and education, and employment derived from the 2011 Housing and Population Census to rank PSUs. A set of RDIs for administrative regions has been published in the series "Economic and Social Indicators" - Issue No. 977.

The second stage stratification criteria are community, household size and average monthly expenditure of the household.

Sample size

From 1999 to 2003, around 6,500 households were covered each year. In 2004, the sample was increased to 8,640 so that reliable quarterly estimates of labour force, employment and unemployment could be worked out. As from 2005, the sample for the year has been further increased to 11,280. Furthermore, in order to measure quarterly changes, 50% of the households sampled in a quarter are re-interviewed in the following quarter; for example, 50% of the households sampled in the first quarter of 2005 have been re-interviewed in the second quarter of 2005.

Questionnaire

The CMPHS questionnaire comprises three modules: (a) a basic module common to all rounds of the survey covering the general characteristics of the population (b) a second module covering labour force with in-depth investigation and a core set of questions which are kept constant at all rounds of the survey and (c) a third module grouping other topics of interest but investigated in less details.

Estimation and reliability of results

Estimates worked out from household survey data are inevitably subject to sampling variability since they are based on information collected from only a sample of households rather than from all households. The Standard Error (S.E) which is a measure of this variability, used to set confidence intervals for any estimate (whether a total or a rate) derived from the sample. For example, a 95% confidence interval indicates that there is 95% chance that the upper and lower limits of the interval enclose the true value (which would be obtained if all households had been surveyed). Standard errors and confidence intervals are calculated for the main labour force estimates.

Annex 2

Definitions

Household

A household is defined as either a person living on his/her own or a group of two or more persons, who may or may not be related, but who live together and make common provision for food and other essentials for living.

Employment

Employed population consists of Mauritians aged 16 years and above (16+) who have worked for pay, profit or family gain for at least one hour during the reference week of a month. It includes those who are temporarily absent from work for reasons such as leave with pay, leave without pay and temporary disorganisation of work (bad weather, break down of equipment, lack of order, etc.).

It is to be noted that as from year 2007, labour force estimates are based on population aged 16 years and above, following the amendment to the Labour Act in December 2006 whereby the minimum legal working age is 16 years, and the subsequent recommendation by the ILO to be in line with the amended Labour Act.

Unemployment

Unemployed population comprises all Mauritians aged 16+ who are not working but who are looking for work and are available for work during the reference period.

Labour force

Labour force or active population is made up of employed and unemployed population.

Unemployment rate

Unemployment rate is the ratio (%) of unemployment to labour force.

Outside the Labour Force (previously known as inactive population)

Outside the labour force includes all Mauritians aged 16+ years, not forming part of the labour force for reasons such as attendance at educational institutions, engagement in household duties, retirement, old age and infirmity/disablement.

Activity rate

Activity rate is the ratio (%) of labour force to population aged 16+ (active and inactive population).

Employer

An employer is a person who operates his/her own business or trade and hires one or more employees

Own account worker

An Own account worker is a person who operates his/her own business or trade but does not hire employees. He/She may be working alone or with the help of contributing family workers.

Employee

An Employee is a person who works for pay for someone else, even in a temporary capacity.

Apprentice

An Apprentice is a person being trained for a job or trade. He/She may be paid or may receive some pocket money; a paid apprentice is considered as an employee.

Contributing family worker

A Contributing family worker is a person who works without pay in an enterprise operated by a family member.

Educational attainment

Primary: comprises persons who have studied up to a "Standard" between Standard 1 and the Certificate of Primary Education (CPE) or equivalent.

Secondary: comprises persons who have studied up to a "Form" between Form 1 and the Higher School Certificate (HSC) or equivalent.

Tertiary: comprises persons who in addition to their secondary educational certificates (SC and HSC or equivalent) also possess either a certificate/diploma (which is above the HSC but below a first degree) or a degree.

^{1.} The above figures have been worked out in order to give a set of comparable labour force estimates obtained from different sources. Users are cautioned in the use of these figures given that there are differences related to the reference period, coverage and methodology. The different sources from which these estimates have been obtained are as follows:

i CMPHS for Mauritian labour force estimates which are subject to sampling variability as mentioned at Annex 1.

ii The Annual Survey of Employment and Earnings (SEE) carried out in March of each year. Employment figures refer to jobs in large establishments employing 10 or more persons and include both Mauritians and foreign workers.

iii Employment in 'other than large' establishments has been estimated after reconciling data from CMPHS, SEE and administrative sources.
